The college develops a formal mechanism of obtaining feedback from students on curriculum. Our feedback committee collects such feedback from students and prepares a report and sends it to the head of the Institution..

Institution has developed feedback system which helps to improve the performance and quality of the Institution. Our feedback committee collects, analyses and put it in LMC meeting to discuss on it and lastly necessary information is communicates to concerned persons. Faculty of every department collects detailed information and their current position of pass out graduates.

According to the student's feedback about course and teachers, most of the students thought that they have chosen their subjects of their choice and they want to make their carrier in the field of their subject respectively. Most of the students are satisfied about their course they have chosen and respective teachers who taught them. They also showed interest in their respective subject to make it as carrier option and also to acquire useful knowledge they think whatever the course they have chosen by them would help them in future to achieve their targets. They felt that the course obtained them would help achieve their aims. Some students suggested that the teacher should provide extra knowledge about the various competitive examinations like M.P.S.C., U.P.S.C. and similar other such examinations.

All teachers encouraged student's participation in the class with discussion. Several teachers are courteous and some are indifferent. Students completed their assessment regularly and they thought it will have improved their grade and at the same time all teachers provided feedback of their performance with the helpful comments.

Name of the Practice: 'Women Empowerment Cell'

Which means she is benevolent as well as courageous, tolerant, stubborn all is different aspects of female personality.

But even in this computer age same thing is not found. She is observed as appressed, suppressed & depressed. On one hand she is the most learned part of society, but many of them are illiterate. Traditions, customs trapped her in the cultural bondage, where she can't spent time for her development. Conditions are more serious in rural areas where women are kept away from educational, social and political development. So the college is tried to work in this field by establishing forum called 'Women Empowerment Cell' which is need of this age. Activities:-

'Women Empowerment' is the thought that implemented through various programmes. The entire department is aware of this and acts in this way. 'Nirbhaya' is the year book collection of articles from various faculties, and this year's book was published in NSS programme. In the year 2011-2012 college undertake the programme like 'Jagar Janiwancha' in which 'Beti Bachao' (Save Girl Child), women empowerment programmes taken from the last 4 years. These themes were also included in the college gathering.

'Muktai Pratishthan' is working constructively in the field of 'Women Empowerment' through 'Muktai Mahila Manch' since Durga festival-2010. Being our paternal organization 'Muktai Pratishthan' always guides college. Taking inspiration from 'Muktai Mahila Manch' college started a new forum for girl students in our college. It essentially made for developing positive change in the attitude of girl student. So she could face this world confidently. Problems encountered:

To overcome this problem some time teachers have to visit their houses and counseled them, later on their participation was increased.

Impact of the practice/Evidence of success:

Impact is easily seen like change in personality and approach. At first in academic year 2011-2012 NSS camp a girl student Shilpa Kamble delivered a speech on 'Women Empowerment'. So this subject was introduced since it was continued in every year NSS camp. Later on in the academic year 2012-2013 a camp on Female Health & Hygiene was conducted and it was followed by various programmes like awareness rally, health camps, recruitment in force were conducted. It enhanced their imagination. The best example of this was all girls students arranged one act play on the subject of 'Save Girl Child' titled 'Beti Ek Anmol Ratan'. In the academic year 2012-2013 various faculties delivered lectures on the topics of women like place of women in this world, Challenges before women, Gender equality etc. Girl's students started participating in activities like village survey, so they can understand the reality of womens problems. It leads to increase number of student's participation.

Best Practice 2**Name of the Practice: Voting Awareness Programme****Introduction of the practice:**

In entire world Indian democracy is considered as ideal. Voting and Election is the soul democracy. But the percentage of direct voting is very less. This kind of poor participation in voting is the major hurdle in the success of Indian democracy. Right from independence to present day voting percentage is remarkably low. This gives rise to corrupt, criminal back grounded candidates are been introduced in this field. To stop this every citizen must vote without any bias and perform his/her constitutional duty. And this is need of our time.

Another issue in this context is that paper ballot voting has been changed into Electronic Voting System. Some voters may find it easy but some find it difficult. Regarding this Department of Political Science has undertaken comprehensive programme to inculcate the values of democracy in students, staff, teachers, ex-students and all voters.

Objective:

Today there is a great change in the process of election and voting, because everyone is with photo identity. Voting lists are refreshed, due to voting machine the process become easier and faster. So, day by day transparency in this system is observed. Apart from this technical thing the values of Indian democracy must restore in every citizen. The programme started with these objectives.

- To find out problems in voting process right from Loksabha to Grampanchayat.
- To understand the problems of voter in participation of political process and policy.

- To search reasons behind poor participation in the voting process.
- To predict the effect of good participation in the nation building.

Practice:

To bring these objectives in reality Department of Political Science chalked out some programme that frequently in touch with voters. The programmes are as follows.

- 1) In 2009's Loksabha election, a rally was arranged and pamphlets were distributed.
- 2) On 8th Oct.2009's Maharashtra Assembly Elections a rally was arranged and pamphlets were distributed.
- 3) Voting awareness programme is taken for 2011 election of Degloor Municipal Council.
- 4) On 8th Dec.2011 a programme related with importance of voting on occasion of Degloor Municipal Council Election. Programme was taken in slum areas of Degloor and pamphlets were distributed.
- 5) On 5th April 2014 a programme on 'Swearing for Vote' was conducted. All students swore to vote in the presence of Hon.Tahsildar (Degloor Tahsil), Principal VDMD College Degloor.
- 6) In 2014's Maharashtra Assembly Elections a rally was arranged and pamphlets were distributed.
- 7) On 5th July 2015 the department has organized a lecture on 'Importance of Voting for Healthy Democracy' of Dr Dattahari Honrao of Shri Havgiswami College,Udgir
- 8) In 2015 Grampanchayat election, department has chosen five model villages of Degloor suburban like Narangal, Sundgi, Khanapur, Tadkhel & Mansakkarga were selected. On 28th Sept. 2015 students went in that villages created awareness by arranging rally, distributed pamphlets and Dept. faculty also addressed villagers and appealed to vote in unbiased way.

Problems encountered:

Certainly some hurdles were faced by the Dept. while conducting this programme. They are as follows.

- 1) Some villagers ignored students, they were not looking seriously on what students wants to say about voting process.
- 2) Media, Press didn't take notice of this programme.
- 3) Peoples / Voters were looking at this programme a secondary part of election.
- 4) Voters showed a kind of disinterest for the participation in this programme.
- 5) The budget constraints and insufficient time of the students (They are busy in term work, syllabus and studies)

Impact of Practice/Evidence of success:

- 1) The values of democracy were inculcated amongst the students.
- 2) Students are exposed to village and urban politics.
- 3) Students are in real act of voting process.
- 4) Present programme motivated teachers, staff, ex-students, volunteers and well wishers.
- 5) Programme also motivated voters to think before vote.
- 6) They were known the importance of voting.

We feel that we have succeeded in spreading and etching the significance of the issue in the minds of students. The overwhelming and enthusiastic response of the students to this activity can be considered as the evidence of success.
